Getting Started

Begin your research by brainstorming keywords - the words and phrases you'll use to search for books, articles, websites, government documents, and other resources. These may include names of people and places or historical concepts like eras and movements. A librarian can suggest "subject headings" to find the most relevant resources.

Example Keywords & Subject Headings

Nelson Mandela Apartheid South Africa history Anti-apartheid movement

Apartheid -- South Africa -- History.

Mandela, Nelson, 1918-2013

South Africa -- Politics And Government -- 1948-1994.

Primary & Secondary Sources

Start your search at the library catalog. You will need to use both primary and secondary sources for your project. You can often find both in the library catalog and place holds on materials, if needed.
